# Wikipedia: Grey Literature











Grey literature (or gray literature) is a term used to refer to materials and research produced by organizations, outside of the traditional <u>commercial</u> or <u>academic publishing</u> and distribution channels. Common grey literature publication types include reports (<u>annual</u>, research, <u>technical</u>, project, etc.), <u>working papers</u>, government documents, <u>white papers</u> and <u>evaluations</u>. Organizations that produce grey literature include government departments and agencies, civil society or <u>non-governmental organisations</u>, academic centres and departments, and private companies and consultants.



# Wikipedia: Grey Literature Network Service



- Less primary sources, more secondary sources
- Take a more neutral, less promotional tone in the text
- On entering paragraph headings, consider Wiki jargon e.g. History



- Add more External Links to other non-cited sources in the text

  - After revising the above, then consider a "GreyNet" Disambiguation page
