Pisa Declaration on Policy Development for Grey Literature Resources

Introduction

A wealth of knowledge and information is available to organizations, governments and industry serving a wide range of subjects areas and professional fields, not controlled by commercial publishing. These publications, data and other materials known as grey literature, are an essential resource in achieving comprehensive, research, policy making for business, industry, professional practice, and civil society. Grey literature is recognized as a true source of evidence, argument, innovation, and understanding in many disciplines including science, engineering, health, social sciences, education, the arts and humanities.

Grey literature is essential to policy development. It provides a means of research and information that is not controlled by commercial publishing. In order to realize the benefits of research and information for education, government, civil society, education and the economy, this declaration is a call to action for all stakeholders, particularly the information for open access to research, innovation, evidence-based policy, and knowledge transfer.

To achieve the full benefits of grey literature for local, national and global communities we call for and encourage the following:

Objectives

1. Create commitment to open access by governments and organizations.
2. Create cooperation and coordination among organizations engaged in the production, use, retention and management of grey literature.
3. The use of persistent identifiers and open standards for grey literature.

Recommendations

1. New forms of recognition and reward for quality grey literature materials by governments, universities and other institutions.
2. Increased standards in the production and bibliographic control of grey literature.
3. Development and implementation of open standards in the management of grey literature.
4. Development of good practice guides for the production, dissemination, and retention of grey literature.
